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
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Constitutional Amendments


JUSTICE APPOINTMENT AMENDMENT:

Constitutional Amendment 1 (or CA 1) proposes a change to the structure of how judicial officers are appointed. Under the current system, the President interviews and nominates people to serve in the judicial branch and then the Senate confirms them. This constitutional amendment changes that process. It establishes that all officers in the judicial branch are instead hired by a committee composed of two Senators and the President, which then make a decision together on the topic, before the candidate goes in front of the Senate. Additionally, this CA allows the Supreme Court to hire an additional member of the Judicial Branch to facilitate court operations. Arguments in favor of this amendment are that it allows the Senate to be better informed and ensures that both branches are involved in the process of hiring the Supreme Court, as well as hopefully helping insulate the Supreme Court from personal biases

EXECUTIVE RESTRUCTURING AMENDMENT:

Constitutional Amendment 2 (or CA 2) proposes a change to the structure of voting for the President and Vice President. Currently, a presidential candidate and a vice presidential candidate must run together as a ticket. This Constitutional Amendment means that candidates are no longer bound by the constitution to run together. The arguments in favor of this amendment emphasize the fact that this will allow candidates to run for the role that they are most interested in without needing to find another individual to take on the other role. Additionally, it provides voters with the advantage of being able to pick their preferred candidates for each role without being forced to vote for another candidate who the voter doesn't believe is the best fit for that office.


TOGETHER


TRANSPARENCY AND ACCOUNTABILITY:


Another reason is to help fellow military students who are in need. Many service members and veterans need help handling school life and transitioning so it is important to make campus feel more like home.







NUMBER OF SEATS


WHAT IS ASUOP SENATE?
